Club members can also read the newsletter online.

Please start talking with your club members about new ideas and projects for the federation. There's room now to dream about these things we didn't think we could do before, and actually make them happen. The NFMS has a lot to look forward to.

Meet your Bulletin Aids Chair - Priscilla Hall-Ford



Hello fellow rockhounders. I am Priscilla Hall-Ford, and I am a 3rd generation rockhounder, and my daughter who is now interested is a 4th generation rockhounder. I am the Secretary, Newsletter editor and NFMS Director of Oregon Agate and Mineral Society.

My interest in rockhounding started while watching my grandfather make cabochons in their basement. Every year my grandparents would have an open house at Christmas time and invite club members over and I got to help out at the party and meet the club members. When I was about 8 my grandparents Gertrude and Bill Hall took me with them on a rockhounding trip to the Richardson Ranch. There I got to get into the Sunset agate bed and help dig out one of the largest pieces of sunset I have ever

seen. To this day I still yet to see one bigger.

I can remember helping grandma and grandpa setting up their cases for a few local shows. My grandfather took me over to Camp Hancock and taught me how to make my first cab. A memory I will never forget. I had the honor to give back this last summer and was asked to go back there and teach others to make their own cabs. I am also teaching my daughter and she will be putting in her own case this year.

Life took me in a few different directions. After high school, I met and married Bob Ford. He was a Naval Aircrewmen in the U.S. Navy. We were soon transferred to San Diego, and we had two beautiful kids, Elizabeth and Robert. Then on to Okinawa Japan for a 3 year tour of duty. After returning back state side we decided to settle down near family. During the time our kids were growing up I was active in just about all they did.

My husband and I opened up Bobs Automotive, so I was able to be a stay at home mom. I was able to help with little league, softball, 4-H, even started our own 4-H club and became a leader and after a couple years was voted in to be the assistant superintendent and that lasted 10 years. I was even the key leader for 3 years and was in charge of a group of youths showing at the state fair. Then on to high school years our son was into Football and Wrestling. One night, my mother brought a small box of slab pieces that my father had sketched out shapes on. She handed me the box and told me I should finish them. It felt good to be working them as I could feel both my father and grandfather watching over my shoulder. 

2024 NFMS Honorary Awardee of the AFMS Scholarship Foundation Award

Each year since 1965 the AFMS Scholarship Fund Foundation has been honoring an individual or couple, from six of the seven AFMS Federations as an Honorary Awardee. The seventh Federation has their own annual scholarship award which is why they do not participate.

The honored shall have made great contributions towards the realization of the avowed purpose and goals of the NFMS. As a NFMS/AFMS Award Winner, the individual or couple chosen are given the honor and privilege of selecting an Educational Institution within the territory of the NFMS, in which to select two Post Graduate Students studying for their Master's or Doctor's Degree in the division of the Earth Sciences or Jewelry Arts.

These students will each receive a scholarship grant in the amount of \$4,000.00 from the AFMS Scholarship Fund Foundation. Since 1965 the Foundation has awarded \$2,083,050.00 to 700 students in the Earth Sciences or Jewelry Arts.

The money raised for the AFMS Scholarship Fund Foundation has been made by donations, specifically by individual club members and clubs affiliated with the AFMS across the United States. The object of the Foundation is to accumulate a Fund, using only the income from the Fund to be used to finance Scholarships.

The principal cannot be used for any purpose whatsoever hence the usefulness of the Fund is perpetual.

Selection of an Award Winner and the students has always been a cherished part of our NFMS year. We received three nominations this year for the award which was inspiring. All were wonderful candidates, but we can only choose one each year. The nominees who weren't chosen this year will be reviewed for the award again next year, along with any new nominations we receive from members of the NFMS.

The NFMS awardee this year is Dr. Collin Kaeder. He has been with the Oregon Agate and Mineral Society since 1974 which warmed our hearts. His passion for rocks began when he was a little boy. He and friends would search through the gravel driveways of neighbors to find agates. His education led him to become a Dr. of Anesthesiology. After retiring, he enjoyed making canoes and soon got back into digging and cutting rocks. He invites anyone interested in the lapidary arts to his home where he teaches how to cut thunder eggs, polishing, tumbling, and making cabs. He loves to show his skills at making lamp shades and picture windows. He can work a rock saw like nobody's business. He has been a great resource for his club in the identification of all kinds of rock and is an excellent resource when it comes to safely working with various kinds of rock material.

Every year Dr. Kaeder has been active in volunteering as an instructor at the NFMS Rockhound Retreat-Camp Handcock, held at the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry (OMSI). He volunteers at his home society's annual show held at (OMSI) and has held the office of President for his society twice. Our congratulations to Dr. Collin Kraeder as the 2024 NFMS Honorary Awardee of the AFMS Scholarship Foundation Award. 
